They refer to morphological or rather morpho-syntactic characteristics of languages. Whereas analytic languages have very few affixes (for example, Modern English), synthetic languages have many (for example, Latin, Old English). (OGrady et al. 1997: 334) Using the quantifiers very few and many, this definition by OGrady et al. shows that it might be problematic to speak about synthetic and analytic languages as fixed or closed categories in a structuralist way. They rather denote prototypical categories or general tendencies, as there is hardly any language which entirely belongs to one or the other category. Even a prototypically analytic language like Present-Day English (PDE) has both grammaticalized synthetic elements and tendencies towards new syntheticity, as OGrady et al. or Danchev have shown. In a synthetic language, four lexical categories are usually concerned with inflection: verbs, nouns, pronouns and adjectives. Since Old...



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
